They are always entertaining, and the barbershop quality is remarkable. The good news is that Minneapolis will be hosting in 2017. The fact is those who achieve anything worthwhile in barbershopping or in any other part of life are bound to be the target for the jabs and jibes of jealous, lesser men. Furthermore, the person who, for fear of criticism, tries to please everyone ends up pleasing no one.

"He who fears criticism," declared Thomas Jefferson, "is hopeless. Only those who do things are criticized. The idler is lost sight of in the march of eventsô but the doer is watched and criticized.
